The other Portion is entirely supplied from the weekly Contributions of the Performers.

Applications to the Public in behalf of this salutary Institution have rarely

been made, and sometimes very ineffectually.

On these Considerations therefore the Lovers of Dramatic Entertainments are respectfully addressed for their Encouragement at This Evening's Performance. (See Genest, VII, 365–66.)
